Army ROTC



The Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) is a college elective that develops Leadership Skills in students as they prepare for Military Service. Army ROTC offers a commission as a second lieutenant in either the active Army or Reserve Forces in a variety of career fields including Combat Arms (Aviation, Armor, Artillery, Infantry, or Engineers), Combat Support, and Combat Service Support

branches. There are two-, three-, and four-year scholarship programs available. Some cadets choose to join the National Guard or the Army Reserve while in Army ROTC, thus qualifying them for the Montgomery GI Bill benefits, in-state tuition (VANG) and other exciting benefits.

Training with Army ROTC is a new experience every week. Training covers a wide range of skills that are needed to be an Officer in the Army. It includes Situational Training Exercises to teach and practice the different types of offensive operations and tactics used on the battlefield. Rappelling to teach the proper use of knots and to build confidence in cadet's abilities to rappel. Land Navigation to learn the ins and outs of map reading and navigating the land with just a map and a compass. Combat Water Survival Test to test one's abilities in the water during stressful situations. Physical Fitness 3 days a week to make sure cadets are in top shape to pass the Army Physical Fitness Test. Skiing/Snowboard once a year to give the battalion a little extra cohesiveness. There is also a Military Ball and Dining In to bring everyone in the battalion together to have some fun and bond outside of training. **armyrotc.syr.edu**

Air Force ROTC



Air Force ROTC is designed to recruit, educate, and commission officer candidates as future leaders in the Air Force and Space Force through college campus programs around the country. programs around the country. Air Force ROTC detachments are located at 145 host college and university campuses throughout the U.S. and Puerto Rico. Students attending college near Air Force ROTC host institutions can attend classes through 1,100+ separate

crosstown enrollment programs or consortium.

Air Force ROTC offers a series of specialized classes and hands-on Leadership Laboratories that will give you a better understanding of the different functions of military leadership and will provide the tools to help you succeed in your future career as an Air Force or Space Force officer. A cadet in the program will take two Air Force ROTC classes per semester: Aerospace Studies and Leadership Laboratory. During the summer between their sophomore and junior year, they will participate in Field Training, a two-week encampment that includes physical conditioning, weapons, and survival training. **afrotc.syr.edu**

Kent Syverud

Chancellor and President, Syracuse University

Chancellor Kent Syverud is the 12th Chancellor and President of Syracuse University. A legal scholar and educator, Chancellor Syverud earned distinction as a strategic thinker and visionary leader who has put forward a bold strategic plan to position the University for growth and recognition as a thriving global research university.

At Syracuse, Chancellor Syverud identified four key institutional priorities: providing an outstanding undergraduate experience; empowering research excellence; fostering and supporting change and innovation; and positioning Syracuse as the best university in the world for veterans. The Chancellor also launched a three-pronged initiative, Fast Forward Syracuse, to achieve these ambitious goals. Part of that initiative is an academic strategic planning process that builds on historic institutional strengths, positions the University to anticipate and quickly respond to emerging challenges and opportunities, and aligns the academic goals with a new framework for the physical transformation of the main campus. A native of Irondequoit in Upstate New York, Chancellor Syverud came to Syracuse from Washington University in St. Louis, where he served as dean and the Ethan A.H. Shepley Distinguished University Professor at the School of Law. Prior to that, he served as dean at Vanderbilt Law School and as associate dean for academic affairs and professor at University of Michigan Law School. At Syracuse, he continues to teach each semester as a member of the College of Law and School of Education faculties. An elected member of the American Law Institute, Syverud's scholarship has addressed negotiation, civil litigation, dispute resolution, and higher education.

Chancellor Syverud has a bachelor's degree from Georgetown University School of Foreign Service and a law degree and master's in economics from University of Michigan. He counts among his closest mentors retired U.S. Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, for whom he clerked shortly after she became the first woman named to the Supreme Court bench.

In addition to his higher education leadership, Chancellor Syverud was appointed in October 2016 to the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Academic Advisory Council, where he, and other academic leaders, advises DHS on homeland security, career opportunities for graduates, campus resilience and academic research. In January 2017, Chancellor Syverud began a two-year term as Commissioner for the Middle States Commission on Higher Education. In this role, Chancellor Syverud works with his colleagues to refine and implement accreditation standards and define the strategic direction and processes of the Commission. In 2016 he completed six years of service as one of the two trustees of the \$20 billion Deepwater Horizon Oil Spill Trust.

Chancellor Syverud is married to Dr. Ruth Chen, an accomplished environmental toxicologist and professor of practice at Syracuse University's College of Engineering and Computer Science. They are the parents of three grown sons, Steven, Brian, and David; and they have one granddaughter.

Office of Veteran and Military Affairs

Syracuse University has been engaged in educating military personnel since 1917, when the student body voted in favor of offering military training on campus on February 28, 1917. They then formed the predecessor to today's ROTC units with the first Syracuse University Cadet Corps and marched in the first Chancellor's Review on May 4, 1917. Military education and training has been offered by Syracuse University ever since, including Army and Air Force ROTC, training active duty soldiers and sailors during World War I, running training programs for the Army, Air Force, and Navy during World War II, and offering a variety of military education programs offered across campus. Syracuse University enjoys a long history of serving veterans, most notably for its unprecedented response to veterans returning from World War II. Chancellor William P. Tolley was committed to realizing the vision of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944, better known as the GI Bill, which he had helped craft as president of the American Association of Colleges from 1942-1943.

The University's commitment to serving Post-9/11 veterans began in earnest in 2007 with the founding of the Entrepreneurship Bootcamp for Veterans with Disabilities in the Martin J. Whitman School of Management. It was the kernel of what has become the Institute for Veterans and Military Families (IVMF). The IVMF was launched in June 2011 to serve all 25 million U.S. veterans, focusing on the social, economic, education and policy issues affecting them and their families post-service. It offers a portfolio of programs to serve the veterans, transitioning military personnel, and military family members. Through the IVMF's focus on veteran-facing programming, research and policy, employment and employer support, and community engagement, the institute provides in-depth analysis of the challenges facing the veteran community, captures best practices and serves as a forum to facilitate new partnerships and strong relationships between the individuals and organizations committed to making a difference for veterans and military families.

Chancellor Kent Syverud reaffirmed Syracuse University's historic commitment to veterans in his inauguration address on April 11, 2014. He challenged Syracuse University to become "the best place for veterans." In order to lead this charge, he appointed Dr. J. Michael Haynie, Executive Director of the Institute for Veterans and Military Families, to also serve as Vice Chancellor for Veteran and Military Affairs in July 2014. Haynie established the Office of Veteran and Military Affairs in January 2015, thus recreating a new version of Chancellor Tolley's veterans offices to serve the current "Greatest Generation" of American veterans.

The Office of Veteran and Military Affairs (OVMA) serves as Syracuse University's single point of entry for all veteran and military related programs and initiatives. Committed to being the "Best Place for Veterans," OVMA assists university stakeholders to support and empower veteran, military connected, and military family member students and employees who are veterans at Syracuse University.
