EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



ince Spanish-American War veteran William Herbert Johnson's graduation from the College of Law in 1903, Syracuse University made the goal of earning a college education attainable for veterans and their families. We have supported our students for over 150 years with superior academic programs and support. Today the university is home to tremendous veteran and military-connected programs and initiatives such as one of the longest continuously running Army ROTC programs in the nation, one of the first Air Force ROTC programs to be authorized in the U.S. Air Force, the Defense Comptrollership Program (DCP), the Military Visual Journalism Program (MVJ), the U.S. Army's Sergeants Major Academy Fellows Program, the National Security Studies Program (NSSP), and the Wohl Family Veteran Legal Clinic (VLC).

This year marks the 80th anniversary of the original GI Bill, a landmark legislation that enabled World War II veterans to access higher education and pursue the American Dream. As the Office of Veteran and Military Affairs (OVMA) begins celebrating ten years of serving veteran and military-connected students, we renew our commitment to making Syracuse University the "Best Place for Veterans." Our dedication to recruiting, admitting, enrolling, matriculating, graduating, and finding post-graduation careers for veterans and military-connected students aligns with Chancellor Kent Syverud's vision. OVMA stands on firm ground as we look to the future. That bright future includes a current enrollment comprised of 6% of the enrolled student population being veteran and military-connected students, and we are continuing to grow. This milestone reflects the remarkable work of our admissions team, increasing veteran and military-connected student enrollment 300% since the office was established ten years ago. This year, our Army and Air Force ROTC programs commissioned 38 cadets to Second Lieutenants and the ROTC program continues to grow to new enrollment heights every year.

Veteran and military-connected students consistently report their top reasons for choosing Syracuse University are an opportunity to leverage their GI Bill and Yellow Ribbon Program, and the university's sterling reputation supporting veterans and military-connected students. We will continue to provide resources related to academic advising, career development, resiliency support, and community-building. Our OVMA Resiliency Program (ORP) is a newly created program designed to help veteran and military-connected students navigate their educational journey by providing coordinated care and resource support as they transition to university life.

The veteran and military-connected students you see detailed in these pages represent our enduring commitment to the value of Syracuse University. As a veteran and Syracuse University alumnus myself, I feel a profound sense of gratitude to serve alongside a team of professionals with servant hearts as we enable success in higher education and beyond. Please enjoy reading this year's end-of-year report, and join us as we begin celebrating the 10-Year Anniversary of the OVMA this upcoming academic year.

Jude Akpunku is a currently serving U.S. Navy officer and a second-year law student in the College of Law. Benetta Dousuah is a U.S. Army veteran pursuing her master's degree in social work at the David B. Falk College of Sport and Human Dynamics. These three amazing Tillman Scholars increase the university's total scholar count to thirteen.

Zahra Johnson

U.S. Army Sergeant and Army ROTC Cadet Syracuse University College of Arts and Sciences M.S. Forensic Science (Concentration in Medical Legal Death Investigation)



Growing up in Afghanistan, Zahra Johnson witnessed first-hand the devastating impact of a flawed justice system on a nation and knew she had to make a difference.

Her dream is to contribute to a better and more just world. Zahra holds a BS in Forensic Science and is currently completing a master's degree in the same subject at Syracuse University. The unforeseen death of her uncle in the Afghan Army--and the devastating impact of a flawed and impaired investigation of his death left on her family--prompted her to focus her career on medicolegal death investigation to ensure timely, thorough, and accurate investigations of tragic events.

Zahra enlisted in the US Army as a Chemical, Biological, Radioactive and Nuclear specialist after graduating from college. Now in the Green to Gold program, she aims to become a Criminal Investigative Division (CID) agent and a death investigator after completing her graduate work, leading and training soldiers on effective investigations. Zahra is determined to dedicate her career to pursuing improvements in the death investigation system in the US Army to ensure that family, military units, and the nation receive clear, accurate, and timely information in the wake of tragedy.

U.S. Navy Lieutenant Syracuse University College of Law Juris Doctor



Jude Akpunku is a dedicated public servant with a deep commitment to public service and a strong background in defense and data analysis. His academic journey began at the United States Naval

Academy, where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree, followed by a Master of Science from the Naval Postgraduate School in 2021.

In his current role as a Congressional Fellow, Jude has proven to be a trusted advisor on defense policies, actively contributing to legislative drafting and providing essential guidance on national security matters. Notably, Jude has championed diversity and inclusion through his consultation and lobbying for the H.R.8248 - Diversity in Military Leadership Act. Jude's outstanding military career in the United States Navy includes positions as a Personnel Officer, Action Officer, and Operations Intelligence Officer. He consistently demonstrated strong leadership and analytical skills, managing critical systems and facilitating diplomatic relations. His role as a personnel specialist was vital to the success of Operations Allies Refuge.

Recognized for excellence, and military service, Jude has been honored with the Navy Commendation Medal and the Navy Achievement Medal twice, and the Outstanding Thesis Award from the Naval Postgraduate School

Jude's aspirations are rooted in creating a more inclusive and equitable world. With his legal education, he intends to continue serving and advocating for positive change in his communities, reflecting the values and spirit of the Pat Tillman Scholarship.

After high school, Benetta joined the U.S.

Army where she served as a unit supply sergeant.

She was later stationed at Camp Humphreys,

South Korea where she attended the Army Basic

Leader Course and graduated as the class Honor

Graduate, ranked #2 in her class of 113.

Currently pursuing a master's in social work at Syracuse University, Benetta aspires to become a social worker with a specific focus on serving as a Sexual Harassment/Assault Response and Prevention (SHARP) representative at a behavioral health clinic on a military installation. She aims to improve SHARP processes and investigations.

Benetta currently interns at the Syracuse University Veterans Legal Law Clinic as the inaugural recipient of the Wendy Goidel scholarship. Her internship focuses on assisting veterans dealing with challenges such as homelessness, food insecurity, and disability claims.

Benetta is a member of Social Workers United (SWU). She is currently hosting a drive to collect school supplies for children in Liberia, where seven out of ten children live in extreme poverty and lack learning materials and school supplies.

Benetta resides in Watertown, New York, with her five-year-old daughter.

PAVE is an initiative focused on linking newly matriculated student veterans with established members of the military-connected community on campus. The result is a close-knit, resilient community with members that can lean on one another to ease with the transition into higher education.



MILITARY VISUAL JOURNALISM

ounded by Fred Demarest in 1963, Syracuse University's Newhouse School has been the home to the Military Visual Journalism Program.

Active-duty servicemembers who are Mass Communication and Public Affairs specialists study at Newhouse for ten months under a contract with the Department of the Navy (DON).

While at Newhouse, students hone their skills and become higher-level storytellers for their respective military branches, taking classes in photography, broadcast and digital journalism, sound, documentary, multimedia, social media, design, and communications.

The students who study at Newhouse are non-commissioned officers. This year, eight Sailors and eight Marines earned a certificate of completion, along with 30 undergraduate credit hours and the ability to matriculate to Syracuse University to earn a bachelor's degree from the Newhouse School of Public Communications.

BETTY AND MICHAEL D. WOHL VETERANS LEGAL CLINIC

KEEPING OUR PROMISE, HONORING THEIR SERVICE



ounded in 2015, the Betty and Michael D. Wohl Veterans Legal Clinic at the College of Law is now in its ninth year of providing quality legal advice to veterans in Syracuse and across New York State. The Veterans Legal Clinic (VLC) provides legal representation to veterans and their families seeking benefits from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) or upgrading a military discharge through the various military branches. The VLC is staffed by student attorneys in their 2L or 3L year at the College of Law, many who are veterans themselves, or who have a connection to the military, and a passion for serving veterans.

During the summer semester, students with VLC worked together to write an amicus brief to the U.S. Supreme Court in the case of Van Dermark v. McDonough. The case presented important questions about the obligation of the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs to reimburse veterans for their out-of-pocket costs for emergency medical treatment received outside the United States. The students not only raised issues unique to Mr. Van Dermark but also highlighted the need for clearer policies by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs covering veterans seeking medical treatment overseas.

In the fall, the VLC was awarded a \$150,000 Legal Services for Homeless Veterans grant from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. The program is a new grant opportunity to fund legal services providers. The VLC began partnering with the Syracuse VA Medical Center's Health Care for Homeless Veterans program to identify critical needs of veterans struggling with homelessness to connect them with medical care and disability compensation.

Throughout the year, the VLC hosted a Social Work intern from the David B. Falk College of Sport and Human Dynamics. The new Legal-Social Work Partnership supports social work students interested in working at the intersection of law and social work and promotes a stronger legal system that can address the holistic needs of veterans. Syracuse University Tillman Scholar and U.S. Army Veteran Benetta Dousuah was selected as the first intern for this program.







MILITARY AND VETERANS LAW SOCIETY

The Military and Veterans Law Society (MVLS) is a student-run College of Law organization that provides law students an opportunity to engage with and assist veterans and military members in the community.

Over the past year, led by President 3L Meghan Wright, MVLS leadership participated in the fall student veteran welcome, the Veterans Day Fun Run, co-hosted the College of Law's sixth annual Veterans Day Celebration, and teamed up with Volunteer Lawyers Project of CNY for Valor Day at the New York State Fairgrounds. Before the Thanksgiving holiday, the MVLS distributed 125 free turkeys to area veterans in partnership with Tully Rinckey law firm.

In the fall, the MVLS had the honor of hosting the U.S. Army Court of Criminal Appeals in the Melanie Gray Ceremonial Courtroom in Dineen Hall. The court heard oral argument on a real-world Army appellate case of an Army Soldier convicted of wrongfully broadcasting intimate visual images and making a false official statement. Following the hearing, the three-judge panel, along with the appellate government and defense counsel answered questions from the audience. The MVLS hosted a reception with the court personnel as well as representatives from Fort Drum's 10th Mountain Division Office of the Staff Judge Advocate.







KEITH DOSS



n November 3, 2023 Director of Office of Veteran Success (OVS) Keith Doss was honored as the Hometown Hero during the SU Football vs Boston College game.

United States Navy Senior Chief Petty Officer (Retired) and Syracuse University employee Andrew "Keith" Doss was born

in Syracuse and lives with his family in Jamesville, New York. Keith enlisted and began his active-duty service in 1986 attending bootcamp at Recruit Training Command, Great Lakes, Illinois.

After basic training, he reported to the USS Savannah (AOR-4) Norfolk, Virginia in January 1987 as a Boatswain's Mate and deployed to the Mediterranean Sea, North Atlantic Ocean, and other locations around the world. He served aboard the Savannah until leaving active duty in October 1989 and transferred to the U.S. Navy Reserves. During his career, Keith held various leadership positions such as Rig Captain and Safety Officer during underway replenishment, Unit Senior Enlisted Advisor, Command Senior Enlisted Leader, and Officer-in-Charge of the Cargo Afloat Rig Team (CART) unit. He was mobilized and deployed to the Persian Gulf in February 2003 in support of combat operations during Operations Iraqi Freedom, Noble Eagle, and Enduring Freedom. Following the end of major combat operations, Keith was re-assigned to the Sea of Japan operating area in May of 2003.

Keith is a 26-year Navy veteran - serving both active and reserve duty - and officially retired from the U.S. Navy Reserves on October 1st, 2012. Keith's proudest military moment was providing opportunities for junior sailors to become experts in their ratings and ensuring they were recognized and promoted.

Some of his military awards include the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal (1 award), Navy & Marine Corps Achievement Medal (3 awards), Naval Reserve Meritorious Service Medal, National Defense Service Medal (2 awards), Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal, Navy Unit Commendation Ribbon, Navy Battle E Ribbon, and the Navy Sea Service Ribbon.

Keith began working at Syracuse University in 1990 in several positions under the Business, Finance, and Administrative Services from 1990 to 2010. In 2011, he began supporting the university's student veterans and military-connected students as a Veterans Advisor with University College until 2018. Since 2018, Keith serves as the Director of the Office of Veteran Success where he and his team support veterans and military-connected students with processing their Veterans Administration (VA) education benefits.

In 1991, Keith married the love of his life, Karyn Doss. They have three children, daughters Rebecca (Alexandria, VA) and Danielle (Charlotte, NC) and son Adam (Salt Lake City, UT).

SVO MONTHLY LUNCHEONS



General Officer assignments included the Deputy Commanding General, U.S. Army Cadet Command (ROTC) and Fort Knox, Fort Knox, Kentucky; the 27th Chief of Chemical and Commandant, U.S. Army Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear School at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri; Acting Commanding General, U.S. Army Training Center at Fort Jackson, Fort Jackson, South Carolina; The Commanding General of U.S. Army Cadet Command and Fort Knox, Kentucky; and the Chief of Staff, North American Aerospace Defense Command and U.S. Northern Command, Peterson Air Force Base, Colorado.

BEN SCHWARTZWALDER AWARD

Celebrating Ring of Honor Inductee, Coach Ben Schwartzwalder and The Captain Floyd "Ben" Schwartzwalder Award for Leadership and Service

n September 23, 2023 at halftime at the JMA Wireless Dome between Syracuse football and fellow New York state team Army, legendary Hall of Fame head coach and World War II hero Ben Schwartzwalder was officially inducted into the SU Athletics ring of honor.

Schwartzwalder was the head coach of Syracuse football for 25 years and won the National Championship in 1959. He was also a decorated WWII hero. A paratrooper, he parachuted onto Normandy Beach on D-Day and was among the first group of soldiers that jumped in 1944. Per cuse.com, he rose to the rank of major and ultimately retired as a lieutenant colonel. Schwartzwalder "was awarded a Silver Star, Bronze Star, Purple Heart, four battle stars and a Presidential Unit Citation for his distinguished service."

In honor and memory of Coach Schwartzwalder, Syracuse University established The Captain Floyd "Ben" Schwartzwalder Award for Leadership and Service. The award will be presented annually to a student veteran or military family member enrolled at Syracuse University who through their actions and accomplishments embodies Ben Schwartzwalder's exemplary leadership and service to his country and others. The funding was provided by a generous gift from Mr. Teodore A. Lachowicz '72 and Mr. Clifford J. Ensley '69, '70, G'71.

The 2023 recipient was U.S. Marine Corps veteran Brian McDonald, '24, a student veteran at Falk College of Sport & Human Dynamics.



IAMES LYONS '03 SONS & DAUGHTERS MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT

The OVMA hosted Mr. Bob Lyons and the Syracuse Chapter of Delta Kappa Epsilon Fraternity, Inc. The Delta Kappa Epsilon brothers raised funds in support of the James Lyons '03 Sons & Daughters Memorial Scholarship Fund. 1st Lt. James Lyons was a member of Delta Kappa Epsilon and graduated with an undergraduate degree in biochemistry in 2003. Lyons was killed in action during Operation Iraqi Freedom in 2006 and is believed to be the first Syracuse University graduate killed in the conflict. His friends and family established the scholarship to provide aid for the children of fallen or disabled veterans. It was wonderful to see everyone come together for such a meaningful fundraising cause.

COACH K AWARD

The Captain Michael William Krzyzewski Award for Leadership and Civic Engagement

n 2022, in honor of Mike "Coach K" Krzyzewski's retirement, Syracuse University established The Captain Michael William Krzyzewski Award for Leadership and Civic Engagement recognizing his commitment to service and his military service. Mike "Coach K" Krzyzewski's is a Naismith Hall of Fame coach, a five-time national champion as Head Coach at Duke University, and a six-time gold medalist as head Coach of the U.S. Men's National Team. But what you may not know is he is also a veteran. Krzyzewski separated from the military in 1974 as a captain, following his graduation from West Point in 1969.

The Captain Michael William Krzyzewski Award for Leadership and Civic Engagement will now be presented annually to a Syracuse University student veteran, serving military member or a military family member enrolled here, who through their actions and aspirations embodies Krzyzewski's public and demonstrated commitment to the virtues of honor, empathy and servant-leadership. The Krzyzewski Award honoree will be not only be an exceptional student but also a leader on the campus and in the community.

The Captain Michael William Krzyzewski Award for Leadership and Civic Engagement is made possible through an annual gift from Jim Lee '75 and his wife, Lou Ann Lee.

The 2024 recipient of the award is Micah G. Collins '25. In Micah's 11 years of service he would serve in the XVIII Airborne Corps G2 and the Ranger Military Intelligence Battalion (RMIB), 75th Ranger Regiment. During his time in the 75th Ranger Regiment, Micah deployed a total of six times, received several awards and recognitions, and took part in instrumental training that would shape his leadership philosophy. In the spring of 2023, the Army selected Micah (a Sergeant First Class in the Army) for the Green to Gold Active-Duty Option which he chose and was accepted to Syracuse University, because of their strong military connections and faculty. DR. JOSÉ DIMAS TORRES-LABAWLD G'59

Inducted into the Daniel and Gayle D'Aniello National Veteran Resource Center, Hall of Honor on September 23, 2023.

orn in Puerto Rico, Torres-Labawld was drafted in the U.S. Army in 1951 and was assigned to the 65th Infantry Regiment, known as the "Borinqueneers." He deployed to Korea, where the Regiment participated in some of the fiercest battles of the war to recover and retain South Korean territory lost to the enemy. Discharged from the military in 1953, he returned to Puerto Rico serving eight years in the U.S. Army Reserves. In 1957, he was selected to attend Syracuse University and graduated with a master's degree in public administration from the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs. He returned to Puerto Rico and worked for the Office of the Governor. He had a significant impact on increasing the economic development of the entire island prior to starting a distinguished 35-year career in academia after earning his Ph.D. in 1973. In 2016, Dr. Torres-Labawld was awarded The Congressional Gold Medal by President Barack Obama for his service as part of the 65th Regiment.

THE BORINQUENEERS



In August 1950, Puerto Rico's 65th Infantry Regiment landed at the port city of Pusan on the Korean Peninsula's southern tip, where United States forces had been holding a defensive perimeter against the Communist North Korean invaders. The 65th was sent into action immediately around the vital port of Hungnam in support of the United States Eighth Army and the 1st Marine Division, with attached British Army units. They had become overrun and were completely encircled. In one of the greatest fighting retreats in history, the outnumbered marines battled their way south to the coast. The first friendly troops they saw on the frozen ridgetops were the Puerto Ricans of the 65th Infantry Regiment. The Puerto Ricans supervised the evacuation of Hungnam, finally withdrawing themselves on Christmas Eve, 1950.





